THE FERC GRID RULE HURTS RATEPAYERS, COMPETITIVENESS

The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) is considering a proposal that could cost consumers more than \$10 billion each year and reduce competitiveness. A wide range of groups, representing consumers, businesses, and manufacturers, oppose the rule.
